

### OUR SUMMER CRUISE 2021 Chapter 3

Day 6: Tuesday 6<sup>th</sup> July 2021, High Water Oban 1627 hrs. With several early starts in previous days,

Joshua and I woke late that morning in Oban marina (on the island of Kerrera). It had been decided to muster mid-morning having left the crew of yacht Mojo the night before to settle into their home for the forthcoming days. Prior to meeting up we had discussed various cruising options depending on the weather and crew availability. Accompanying Mandy and Mike were Josh, Mandy's son, and his girlfriend Claire who both had to get back to Oban town by the following Saturday to return home (not forgetting Daisy and Islay, Mandy and Mike's two young and lively dogs, a Springer and Cocker Spaniel).

Our planned options were to cruise northward via the Caledonian Canal to Inverness where Josh and Claire could board public transport to Oban, a circumnavigation of the Isle of Mull and back to Oban or navigate the Crinan Canal to Tarbert also with public transport available for returning to Oban.

After a late breakfast then muster on Mojo we all agreed on the Crinan Canal, often referred to as "the World's most beautiful shortcut", stopping in Ardfern marina that night before entering the canal the following day. A quick check of the tide indicated we should leave before lunch and both crews readied for departure with Mojo refuelling and Serenity leaving first at about 1230 hrs. It was another fine and sunny day cruising south via the sound of Kerrera as we left Oban bathing in sunshine behind us when I received a call from Mandy on my mobile. She had phoned the canal office to enquire if we should expect any delays; something that can often happen with ongoing maintenance issues, bridges or lock gates not opening or even a shortage of water that supplies the canal. Just our good luck then that she had been informed, due to the fabulously good weather we were enjoying, the water level in the canal was indeed low and they were operating with restricted access.



Basically, we would be held up as they were closed until Thursday. This gave us an extra day before we could enter the canal at the Crinan basin, so we made the decision to stop enroute to Ardfern and stay that night in Craobh marina with a short passage to Ardfern the following day before entering the canal on Thursday. The tide in our favour Serenity



continued to Craobh through the narrow passages of Easdale and the Cuan Sound.



Joshua took the helm through both these passages with an eye on the chart plotter as instructed and the other on me as I guided him from the bow, with a number of tight turns required. We arrived back in Craobh marina about 3.30pm and were secured on the same berth we'd been in just a couple of nights previous... this time with an almost spellbindingly surprising sight beside us!



Yacht Mojo was a little further behind and we watched for them coming in then walked around to the other side of the marina to take their lines but they were already securely berthed before we reached them. We enjoyed coffee aboard and discussed our change of plans agreeing to return that evening after dinner, it would be another late start the next day with a short passage to Ardfern so it suited everyone to have a little social gathering that night. Joshua and I returned to Serenity to relax and further study our planned route for the coming days when we were interrupted by a couple walking along the pontoon and who had approached our boat. It was Gordon and Heather Kane! What a delightful surprise and that which had caught my attention earlier in the afternoon as we came into our berth was indeed the familiar and mighty yacht Artemis beside us.

We enjoyed a brief chat; they were both tired after a 14-hour overnight passage from Larne having completed the club annual regatta and spending the following day victualling their very fine Westerly Fulmar before departing EABC on Monday evening. Heather asked us what we were doing for dinner and as we had dined in the local restaurant a couple of days before Joshua and I were just going to eat aboard but Heather insisted we should join them. An invitation the "hungry sailors" couldn't refuse! After a restful afternoon we enjoyed a delicious dinner on board yacht Artemis followed by a short walk around the peaceful surroundings of Croabh marina before



we all gathered on yacht Mojo for a truly memorable EABC party.



Later the sun was setting and the sky lit up with flames of colour reflected in the water only to be broken by the yachts in the marina and the islands beyond with the silhouette of Josh and Claire caught in a romantic embrace...

## Memory Lane

# CLUBHOUSES OLD AND NEW

As we approach the 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the opening of the "new" clubhouse on 12<sup>th</sup> July 1963, I thought I would put together a few jottings about the history of the clubhouses.

The old clubhouse consisted of two Nissen huts, presumably a legacy from the yard being requisitioned by the Admiralty during WW2 for the maintenance and repair of MTBs and other small craft.

The front Nissen hut was the clubhouse and was "heated" by a pot-bellied stove which roasted the front of you while your back froze. The back hut housed a billiard table. I am told by Henry Fletcher that the roof leaked so when balls were cued on a wet day, they sloshed their way across the cloth surface leaving a soggy trail behind them.



A new facade was added to the front one which greatly improved this area:



The building in the background is Sammy Adams' boatshed and beyond that can be seen the chimneys of the Coastguard cottages.

Popular activities at the time included country dancing and at least one fancy dress dance was held.



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If you can identify any other people in the photograph, please let me know.

In 1962 the General Committee decided the time had come to build a new clubhouse to provide better facilities for the expanding membership. Plans were drawn up by Eddy Phillipson and the rear Nissen hut was demolished at the end of the season to enable construction to start on the new building. Club folklore (confirmed by Henry Fletcher) has it that the building was designed around the steel roof joists that Neilly had acquired "at the right price" when the Aluminium Works was demolished.

At that time the club was only a tenant and therefore had no collateral to secure an overdraft. However, in those days bank managers had considerable autonomy in how they ran their branches and the then manager of the Bank of Ireland had sufficient faith in Neil Kitson and Graham Gingles to arrange an unsecured overdraft facility of £1,800 to let construction commence. To put this in perspective, the annual subscription at the time was 5/- (25p) so it was a large amount of money.

The work was done by direct labour (the only name I can remember was that the plasterer was called Nat), supervised by Ernie Stewart the club Honorary Treasurer.

Once the new building was wind and watertight the front Nissen hut was demolished.

The opening date was 12<sup>th</sup> July 1963 and I can still in my mind see Graham Gingles (Graham and Robert's father) on his hands and knees applying the final coat of varnish to the main floor the night before the opening. I can only assume it was quick-drying varnish!

For those who may not know, the floor is maple and was the dance floor in Maxwell's Loughview Hotel in Curran Road (where Loughview flats now are) which was demolished about that time and again acquired by Neil Kitson. This means the floor is well over 100 years old – another example of proper re-cycling!



The "new" clubhouse comprised the present main hall, the kitchen with two small changing rooms (the present training room) and toilets behind it and the Committee Room – now the bar – in front of the kitchen.

The steel structure visible between the winch house and the clubhouse is the carriage for the "patent slip" which had the capacity to haul ships up to 300 tons and was used to slip the dredgers from the Blue Circle Magheramorne cement works for maintenance work. Neil Kitson also built a dredger called the "Magheraglaur" on the big carriage.



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Until the Leisure Centre was built the swimming pool was the only swimming pool in Larne. It was drained, cleaned and re-filled with seawater every week in the summer by Rossi McKeown – Sadler's brother and Geordie Gardiner's great-uncle. Harry Fletcher (Henry's father) maintained the electrically driven pump which was located on the beach.

The "toast rack" dinghy road trailer was made for me by David Kitson to take two OK dinghys side by side.

Note also the power station under construction at Ballylumford with the "new" Blue Pool (Ballylumford Harbour) to the north of it.

Over the years there have been many additions and alterations:

The changing rooms soon proved to be inadequate so in 1970 a new male changing area (now the Ladies) was built and the original ones were revamped into one area (now the Training Room) to provide better female facilities. The new area had the luxury of showers for the first time.

Sadly, Neil Kitson was taken from us at an early age in 1966 so it was entirely appropriate that this major extension was dedicated to his memory.

Finally, in 2020, Peter Doig roofed over the patio to provide a sheltered outdoor bar area in according with the Covid19 "social distancing" regulations, so completing the clubhouse as we know it today.

I am indebted to several of us "more mature" members, mainly Richard and Peter Doig, Henry Fletcher and others for their contributions and correcting my, at times faulty memory.
